Arrival at the LANXESS arena

Arriving by taxi

Cologne central station to the LANXESS arena: Duration 10-15 min, about €10; Cologne Bonn Airport to the LANXESS arena: Duration 15 min, about €25; Düsseldorf Airport to the LANXESS arena: Duration 1 hour, about €75.

Arriving by car

Please note that the LANXESS arena will be sold out on all match days resulting in considerable traffic. Thanks to its central position in the Köln-Deutz district, the LANXESS arena is very easy to reach: just follow directions marked "Kölnarena" and "Kölnmesse". You will find the LANXESS arena immediately next to the Köln-Deutz railway station.

Parking

All media representatives can park on Friday, Saturday and Sunday free of charge in the LANXESS arena car parks P1, P2 and P4 (all open 24 hrs). Take a ticket on entry to the car park and then present this to the Media Centre Info Desk, where you will receive an exit ticket. Parking is available on a first come, first served basis.

Public transport

The LANXESS arena is located directly on the DB-Bahnhof "Bf Köln Messe / Deutz" and at the stops of the Cologne Transport (KVB) "Bf DEUTZ / LANXESS arena" (lines 3 and 4) or "Bf Deutz / Messe" (lines 1 and 9). From there it is only a short walk to the LANXESS arena.



Free-of-charge public transport

Please note that as a media representative you can travel free of charge on buses, trams and the metro in Cologne. You must have your accreditation with you to travel for free.

Media Pack

Journalists will be provided with a media pack containing the official magazine and media guide. This can be collected from the Media Info desk in the Media Centre on arrival.

Photographer and TV bibs

From 10:00 hrs on Friday, 27 May 2016, photographers and TV representatives can collect their bibs from the Media Info desk in the Media Centre for a deposit of €20. These bibs must be worn at all times in the arena and returned after the event. Please note that photographer bibs will only be allocated to those media representatives accredited as photographers.

Photographer briefing

All photographers must attend the briefings on Saturday at 14:00 and on Sunday at 13:30 hrs at the Media Centre where essential information regarding photographer positions, guidelines and timetable will be distributed. The briefing will take place in the press conference room of the Media Centre.

The Media Centre

The Media Centre is located at the "Clubraum West" inside the LANXESS arena, the entrance for media representatives is on the opposite side to the Accreditation Centre. The Media Centre is located close to the media seats and the mixed zone. The press conference room is directly next to the media working area. Workspaces will be available in the media working area. Food should not be consumed in the media working area. The press conference room is located in the Media Centre.

Media seats

Media seats (with tables, cabled internet, wifi and electricity points) will be located in sectors 214 and 215 of the lower tier in the west of the LANXESS arena. Please note that there are a limited number of seats and these will be allocated prior to the event to written media representatives (your media seat number will be indicated on your accreditation). Additional TV observer places will also be available above blocks 212 and 213. There will be media volunteers available to show you to your seats.

Internet access

Wifi and cabled internet connections will be provided to enable you to work both in the media seats and the working room. You will receive a wifi password on arrival. Please note that cabled internet will also be offered in the media seats. The media internet connection must not be used for live broadcasting, for this you are required to order your own separate ISDN line. For TV uploads a separate connection is available — please contact the Host Broadcaster Centre next to Arena Control.

Mixed zone / Flash zone

The mixed zone / flash zone is located in the south-west of the LANXESS arena just next to the Media Centre and the press conference room. Selected rights owners and host broadcaster will have access to the flash zone by prior agreement with EHF Marketing GmbH. The mixed zone is divided into four areas: TV, radio, webTV and written media. These areas will be strictly separated. Photography is not permitted in the mixed zone.



Press conferences

The press conference room is located in the Media Centre "Clubraum West" of the LANXESS arena. The post-match press conferences will take place approximately 15 minutes after each match / winners' ceremony. The head coaches and key players nominated by the EHF will attend the press conferences. Media representatives may ask questions directly at the end of the press conference. The press conferences will be conducted in English. Any questions in your native language should be directed at team representatives after the official end of the press conference.

Video recording

Recording video in the arena, the mixed zone and press conference room (including the use of live streaming services such as Periscope, Meerkat and Facebook Live) is only allowed with the express permission of EHF Marketing GmbH. An agreement must be reached PRIOR to the start of the event in the categories rights holder (RH), non-rights holder (NRH) or WebTV. Special stickers will be issued for equipment that is permitted to take video. Equipment used for video recording without permission will be removed. Written media are not permitted to record video in the arena. Contact EHFM Media Manager, Miguel Mateo for further information ahead of the event.

Catering

Coffee, soft drinks and snacks will be available in the catering area of the Media Centre. This is located in the southwest of the Media Centre just next to the mixed zone. Media representatives will get a symbol integrated on their accreditation to indicate that they are permitted access to media catering. Please note that smoking is not permitted inside the LANXESS arena!

7. Official EHFM Rules of Conduct for ENG Crews

The following guidelines and rules of conduct for ENG Crews have been developed to make the job of ENG crews easier at EHF events. Upon receiving an accreditation and signing for an ENG bib, TV crews automatically agree to follow the Rule of Conduct for TV ENG crews.

- 1. ENG crews are obliged to produce a press identification card upon request.
- 2. The bib and the accreditation are only valid for the VELUX EHF FINAL4 2016.
- 3. ENG personnel are requested to wear the bib and accreditation at ALL times.
- 4. All ENG crews must use the stickers provided on their camera equipment.
- 5. The Host Broadcaster is acting on behalf of the European Handball Federation.
- 6. Only the Host Broadcaster is permitted onto the playing court.
- 7. The guidelines and instructions of the Host Broadcasters MUST be followed at all times.
- 8. ENG crews are not permitted to interfere/obstruct in the work of the Host Broadcaster.
- Right holders have to stay in the positions designated to them during the games. Positions will be allocated based on space available with priority to the broadcasters from the nations of the teams playing.
- 10. At no time, before, during or after the match are ENG crews permitted to stay in the area behind the players' seats or behind the official table. They must place themselves in the position advised by the EHFM.
- 11. Non-rights holders are not permitted to film during the matches.
- 12. ENG crews are only permitted in the TV area of the mixed zone.

Upon collection of the accreditation and bib, ENG personnel are obliged to follow the above-listed rules.

8. Official EHF Rules of Conduct for Photographers

The EHF has developed the following guidelines to make the job of photographers at its events easier. Upon receiving the accreditation and bib the photographer automatically agrees to follow the EHF guidelines of conduct for photographers.

- 1. Photographers are required to attend the briefings in the Media Centre at 14:00 hrs Saturday, 28 May and at 13:30 hrs on Sunday, 29 May.
- 2. Photographers are only allowed to enter the court following the match for 3/4 place and final when permitted to do so. There will be a roped off area clearly marked for photographers in front of the timekeepers' table.
- 3. Photographs can be taken during the player line-up. An area will be defined before the match for this purpose.

 Photographers may stand in this position until the pre-match procedure is over. They must then return to their designated position behind the advertising boards at the ends of the court.
- 4. Photograph bibs should be worn at all times. These will be issued as part of the accreditation process and are available from the Media Info Desk.
- 5. During the match all photographers should be at the ends of the court where seats are available behind the advertising system. Photographers will be advised before the match of any additionally designated areas where they may take photos looking down on the court.
- 6. It is not allowed to change ends during the game. This has to be done at the half-time or at the end of the match. If a photographer wishes to change ends during the half-time break, he/she must follow the routing system.
- 7. Photographers are not allowed to stand behind the players' seats or on the opposite side of the court.
- 8. Photographers have to remain seated and cannot change seats during the match.
- 9. Photographers are allowed to sit in front of the nets after the point where it is fixed to the advertising borders (fixed 3 metres each side of the goal).
- 10. Photographers are not allowed sit or stand in front of or to obstruct the view of the advertising boards.
- 11. Strobe light photography is not permitted.
- 12. Photographers are not allowed to enter the court during the celebration and awarding ceremony which follows the final until they are told to do so. An area in front of the timekeepers' table will be reserved for photographers and ENG crews.

Upon collection of your accreditation you are obliged to follow the above-listed rules.

9. Event information

Eurovision winner to take the stage

Topping the bill at this year's VELUX EHF FINAL4 will be the 2015 Eurovision song contest winner, Måns Zelmerlöw. The Swedish star, who won the contest in Vienna last year and more recently co-presented the Eurovision Song Contest in Stockholm, will sing two songs from his new album 'Perfectly Damaged' - one song before the VELUX EHF Champions League final and one ahead of the winners' ceremony.

Also performing will be singer lyy Quainoo, winner of the first season of 'The Voice of Germany'. She will perform a cover of David Bowie's 'Heroes' as part of the first opening show.

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Facts and figures after the quarter-finals

Exactly 200 matches since the start of the qualification - more than ever - have been played in the VELUX EHF Champions League so far — and the last four will decide everything in Cologne on 28/29 May, which team will follow the now dethroned champions FC Barcelona Lassa.

Here are the most important facts and figures on the 2015/16 season of the competition.

- teams have defended their title since the creation of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 in Cologne in the 2009/10 season, and this story will continue as Barcelona had been eliminated by Kiel in the quarter-finals.
- teams won both legs of the quarter-finals.
- O Spanish teams in the VELUX EHF FINAL4 for the first time.
- team will have their debut in Cologne: Paris Saint-Germain qualified for the first time for this pinnacle event, after the French champions were eliminated twice in a row by Veszprém in the 2014 and 2015 guarter-finals.
- former EHF Champions League winner only has made it to Cologne: THW Kiel (2007, 2010, 2012). So the mathematical chances for a new winner are at 75%.
- nation makes its debut at the VELUX EHF FINAL4: Dener Jaanimaa (Kiel) is the first ever Estonian to come so far in the Champions League.
- player can defend his personal title won in 2015: Nikola Karabatic. PSG's top scorer led FC Barcelona to the trophy one year ago and even was awarded MVP of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 2015.
- coach has won the EHF Champions League with two different clubs so far: Alfred Gislason (2002 with SC Magdeburg, 2010 and 2012 with Kiel). If Kielce or PSG take the trophy in 2016, Talant Dujshebaev, respectively Noka Serdarusic would be the second in history.
- Croat will win the trophy in Cologne, as in every team at least one player comes from Croatia. Vori (PSG), Brozovic, Duvnjak (both Kiel), Buntic, Cupic, Sego, Strlek (all Kielce) Alilovic, Sliskovic and Sulic (all Veszprém) are on court.
- man has won the EHF Champions League as a player (1994 with Santander) and as a coach (2006, 2008, 2009 with Ciudad Real): again Talant Duishebaev.

- pair of brothers will fight for the trophy in Cololgne: Nikola and Luka Karabatic.
- lcelandic coach at least had been involved in all six VELUX EHF FINAL4 so far: Besides Alfred Gislason (now sixth time with Kiel) it were Dagur Sigurdsson with Füchse Berlin (2012) and Gudmundur Gudmundsson with Rhein-Neckar Löwen (2011).
- Spanish coaches are part of the FINAL4 although no Spanish team made it to Cologne: Javier Sabate (Veszprém) and Talant Dujshebaev (Kielce). Two more Spanish coaches (Xavi Pascual/Barcelona and Raul Gonzalez/Vardar) were eliminated in the quarterfinals, two more (Juan Carlos Pastor/Szeged and Manuel Cadenas/Plock) in the Last 16.
- players of the FINAL4 participants have scored more than 100 goals so far the same as last season: Mikkel Hansen (PSG/121) and Momir Ilic (Veszprém/105).

 Besides, Kiril Lazarov (Barcelona, 109) and Dean Bombac (Szeged, 101) have netted in more than 100 times.
- former or current top scorers of the EHF Champions
 League are on court in Cologne: Nikola Karabatic
 (2006/07 89 goals for Kiel) Mikkel Hansen (2011/12 98 goals for Kobenhavn) and Momir Ilic (2013/14 103
 goals for Veszprém, 2014/15 114 goals for Veszprém).
- times the defending Champions League champions had been eliminated in the quarter-finals now: Kiel (2011) and Barcelona (2012 and 2016).
- nations are represented by 22 Men's EHF Champions League winner's titles: Spain (14 titles, including all from 1994 to 2001), Germany (6 titles, including four from six in Cologne), France (Montpellier) and Slovenia (Celje).
- different nations are (for the second time in a row) represented by the four VELUX EHF FINAL4 participants: France, Germany, Poland and Hungary. Seven nations had been represented by the eight quarter-finalist including two German teams.
- times Thierry Omeyer has won the EHF Champions League so far to be the most successful participants of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 2016 – 2003 with Montpellier and 2007, 2010, 2012 with Kiel.

- 5 straight times THW Kiel have now qualified for the VELUX EHF FINAL4. Being at Cologne for the sixth time; the German record champions are record participants.
- times now Alfred Gislason will coach Kiel at Cologne. Javier Sabate (as head coach of Veszprém) and Noka Serdarusic (PSG) are new on the benches in Cologne, while it is Talant Dujshebaev's (Kielce) 5th participation.
- former or current IHF World Handball Players of the Year will be on court in Cologne: Nikola Karabatic (PSG, 2007 & 2014), Thierry Omeyer (PSG, 2009), Daniel Narcisse (PSG, 2012), Mikkel Hansen (PSG, 2011), Slawomir Szmal (Kielce, 2010), Domagoj Duvnjak (Kiel, 2013). In addition, Kielce coach Talant Dujshebaev was awarded twice in 1994 and 1996.
- nations so far had been represented in the VELUX EHF FINAL4 tournaments since 2010: Germany (eleven participants in total including 2015), Spain (8), Poland and Hungary (each 3), Russia, Denmark, France (each 1).
- times (including 2016) Kiel have been part of an EHF Champions League semi-final and lead this statistic ahead of Veszprém (6) and Kielce (3) and PSG (1, all including 2016).
- different clubs since 2009 have qualified for the VELUX EHF FINAL4 since 2010: Kiel (6 times) Barcelona (5), Ciudad Real/Atletico, Veszprém, Kielce (each 3), Hamburg (2), Füchse Berlin, Rhein-Neckar Löwen, Flensburg, AG Kobenhavn, Chekhov, Paris (each 1).
- matches since the start of the group phase ended with a draw, three of them in the guarter-finals.
- different nations are represented in the squads of the four FINAL4 participants: GER, ESP, HUN, POL, CRO, NOR, SWE, DEN, ISL, SRB, FRA, SLO, BIH, EST, MNE, UKR - 9 different at Kiel and Veszprém, 6 at Paris and Kielce.
- matches since the start of the group phase had ended by a margin of +10 or more goals.
- goals was the biggest margin in one match of this Champions League season when Porto beat Vojvodina in the group phase 37:15.
- points were taken by Veszprém in 18 matches to have the highest number of all FINAL4 participants.

- 31 teams representing 20 countries have been part of the VELUX EHF Champions League 2015/16 season including the qualification tournaments.
- 39 goals in one match was the season's lowest score so far, when Skjern beat Metalurg 20:19.
- times, more than 60 goals were scored in all matches since the start of the group phase.
- 65 times in all matches since the start of the group phase, were the away teams the victors, two times it occurred in the quarter-finals.
- 68 matches since the start of the group phase had been attended by 5,000 or more spectators, seven in the Last 16.
- 76 goals in one match was the season's highest score so far, when Zaporozhye beat La Rioja 39:37.
- times in all matches since the start of the group phase, were the home teams the victors, three times it occurred in the quarter-finals.
- **121** goals were scored by Mikkel Hansen (PSG) so far.
- goals have been conceded by PSG with the best defence of all FINAL4 participants.
- 547 goals were scored so far by Kielce with the best attack of all FINAL4 participants.
- 11,276 goals have been scored in all 200 VELUX EHF Champions league matches so far. 248 in the qualification, 9,619 in the group phase, 249 in the play-off matches of Groups C+D, 704 in the Last 16 matches and 456 in the quarter-finals. In average 56,38 goals were scored in every match.
- 15,200 fans attended Zagreb's two matches against PSG in group phase and the quarter-final and the group phase match against Veszprém to be the season's highest attendance so far.
- 19,750 will attend each of the four matches of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 in the sold-out LANXESS Arena in Cologne.

A premiere on holy handball ground

Neither KS Vive Tauron Kielce nor Paris Saint-Germain Handball, contenders of the first semi-final, have made it to the final of a VELUX EHF Champions League before and for PSG it is their first-ever time at the showpiece event that is the VELUX EHF FINAL4.

Despite their lack of experience of the final weekend the French champions go to Germany as favourites against Kielce. But the team from Poland will try hard to end their Cologne curse, as they always lost their semis so far.

Paris Saint-Germain Handball are one of the highest-class debutants ever at the VELUX EHF FINAL4 and although 2016 is the maiden voyage of the French champions at the LANXESS arena, many experts consider Nikola Karabatic & Co. as strong favourites to win the trophy.

Karabatic can make FINAL4 history in Cologne as he would become the first player since the final weekend format started back in the 2009/10 season to defend the title. In the six seasons since, not one single player has held on to the title but Karabatic can. In the 2015 edition he led FC Barcelona to their eighth title in a Most Valuable Player performance before the 2014 IHF World Handball Player of the Year transferred to the French capital.

As Barcelona were eliminated by Kiel at the quarter-final stage this year, Karabatic is now the last survivor of that winning team still in the tournament.

Goalkeeper Thierry Omeyer, like Karabatic, was in the squad of the last (and so far the only French side) to win this competition as they took the honours with Montpellier in 2003 which also included former goalkeeper and current PSG manager Bruno Martini.

Since 2003, Karabatic has added two more trophies (2007 with Kiel and 2015 with Barcelona) to his cabinet, while Omeyer could be heading for his fifth title after winning the EHF Champions League with Kiel a further three times (2007, 2010, 2012).

But standing in their way is an experienced Kielce squad eager to make the next step in Cologne after the Polish champions lost at the semi-final stage twice in their last two participations — both against Barcelona.

"I hope that our time has come now," says Kielce coach Talant Dujshebaev, who is coaching at his fifth VELUX EHF FINAL4, but who has never taken glory, with Ciudad Real (2010, 2011), Atletico Madrid (2012) or Kielce (2015).

As a player, the last but one time Dujshebaev became a EHF Champions League winner was in the 2007/08 finals against THW Kiel - the final international matches of Noka Serdarusic as THW Kiel coach, who is now back in the spotlight as PSG coach, so there could be a delayed opportunity for Serdarusic to take revenge against Dujshebaev.

Serdarusic can count on a world-class squad including former IHF World Handball Players Karabatic, Omeyer, Mikkel Hansen and Daniel Narcisse; while in this ranking Kielce can claim just one, goalkeeper Slawomir Szmal.

The final step on the road to Cologne was similar for both semifinalists, as they each gained a draw and a win in the quarterfinals, but PSG were already clear after their first leg, away at HC PPD Zagreb, as they won 28:20 against the Croatian side.

Kielce's journey was much more nervous, not confirming their qualification until the final attack in the second leg at home against SG Flensburg-Handewitt, taking a 29:28 win on the night, following a 28:28 draw in the first leg in Germany. Paris won their respective group phase in an impressive way, beaten only at Flensburg and by MVM Veszprém in Group A, topping their group and qualifying straight through to the quarter-finals, skipping the last 16.

Kielce finished runners-up in Group B below Barcelona, but then had no problems with HC Meshkov Brest in the Last 16.

The biggest strength of the Polish champions is their defence and their experience, while PSG count on two of the best scorers in the EHF Champions League so far this season with Hansen topping the ranking thanks to 121 strikes in 16 matches and Karabatic with 88 goals. The best Kielce striker is EHF EURO 2016 All-Star Team member Michal Jurecki (85).

The semi-final in Cologne is the first competitive match between the two sides. The only time they duelled so far was in a friendly match in Krakow last summer, when the final result was a 32:32 draw.

Now, one of the opponents will make it to their first VELUX EHF Champions League final in history and with it one coach can make history too.

If one of these semi-finalists win the trophy, either Dujshebaev or Serdarusic would follow Kiel's coach Alfred Gislason and become the second-ever to win the Men's EHF Champions League with two different clubs.

No previous encounters in European competitions

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When you win all the matches in the group phase two times and you gain a place in the history books of the Champions League, it is really a shock to lose the first game in the next edition of the contest. Kielce had to swallow a bitter pill in Szeged after a weak performance in defence and unsuccessfully trying to bridge the gap they had allowed their rivals.

Further matches in the group affirmed that this season was not going to be that kind for the Polish champions. After the first five rounds Kielce had only two victories, two draws and a loss. To make matters worse their next duel with Vardar turned out to be a total disaster. Talant's boys brought back from Skopje a ten-goal defeat, 24:34! But since that moment Kielce got a grip and began to play much better. They won seven from eight matches left and achieved an historic first victory over Barcelona. They had a huge chance to gather a full set of wins, but in the very last moments of the battle in Kristianstad Tobias Reichmann missed a penalty that gave away another draw, 35:35. The scapegoat winger fully made up for his blooper and in the last match against Szeged he gave the club the one and only lead a few seconds before the final whistle scoring an empty-net goal.

During the season they lost their previous captain Grzegorz Tkaczyk due to his shoulder injury, but they also regained the centre back Mariusz Jurkiewicz who debuted at the beginning of March after ten months of struggle with his knee ligaments. Although he still did not play in the Last 16 against HC Meshkov Brest, his team comfortably reached the quarter-finals after winning both legs. Kielce reached their third FINAL4 ticket (and second consecutive) after two thrilling quarter-final legs with Flensburg as only the last minute goal of Krzysztof Lijewski prevented the teams from going to a penalty throw shoot-out.

Having set the bar high in the transfer market last summer, Paris
Saint-Germain Handball's thoughts can only be on a serious challenge for
the VELUX EHF Champions League trophy this season. Veszprém brought an end
to their challenge at the quarter-final stage two years in a row, but this season they finally
embarked on a trip to Cologne.

Former VELUX EHF Champions League winners SG Flensburg-Handewitt, THW Kiel and last season's finalists MVM Veszprém could not stop PSG from finishing first in Group A. After their initial loss in Flensburg, Nikola Karabatic's partners turned things around, winning twelve of the thirteen games remaining, including the group final against "Ljubo's Jungs" from Flensburg, to qualify directly for the quarter-finals. The most impressive performance was probably their seven-goal win against THW Kiel, and even when they struggled away from home like they did in Celje or in Zagreb, Noka Serdarusic's boys still managed to come back with a win. Thanks to the impressive performances by Mikkel Hansen, current top scorer of the competition, Paris ended the group phase as the most prolific attack of the group phase. Defence was not bad either, as Thierry Omeyer is as decisive as he's ever been, helping PSG remaining one of the only two teams who have won all games on home ground.

The Parisians even managed to overcome difficult injuries. The right side was especially affected, since Xavier Barachet suffered an early knee injury and will probably be missing the rest of the season for the same reason. To make up for him, some less known figures stepped in the spotlight. Samuel Honrubia and Sergiy Onufryienko proved to be key against Kiel or Flensburg, while Daniel Narcisse provided much-needed rest for Mikkel Hansen. Finally, PSG looks like the amazing team it has been set to be for some time.

Winning against big teams has given them confidence and proved that they are on the right track, giving them the opportunity not only to reach Cologne for the first time ever but also to be considered one of the final tournament's favourites this time around.





Three is the lucky number - but for whom?

Can THW Kiel make it to a EHF Champions League Final for the seventh time or can MVM Veszprém go one step better than last year and win? These are the major questions ahead of the duel of two powerhouses with a long common history.

Three is the magic number in the second semi-final of the VELUX EHF FINAL 2016.

That is the number of former THW Kiel players who are now in MVM Veszprém's squad - Aron Palmarsson, Christian Zeitz and Momir Ilic.

This semi-final is the third time this season the teams will meet in the VELUX EHF Champions League after home wins in the respective group phase matches against each other.

For the third time in a row the German and the Hungarian record championship winners line-up against each other in a semi-final of the VELUX EHF FINAL4, with one win for each team before; Kiel made it to the final in 2014 and then Veszprém made it to the final in 2015.

If the Hungarian side win, it would mean their third EHF Champions League Final in history after 2002 (defeated by SC Magdeburg, coached that time by Alfred Gislason) and 2015, when they lost against FC Barcelona.

Three-time Champions League winner, Dominik Klein is aiming for a golden farewell from Kiel. He is the last player of the current THW squad who was part of all of their trophies before in 2007, 2010 and 2012, and will leave to join recent EHF Cup finalist HBC Nantes, also leaving will be Joan Canellas, who will transfer to HC Vardar.

Veszprém's left back llic can win his third trophy too but he can also become the VELUX EHF Champions League top scorer for the third straight time. However, he will need a little miracle as currently sitting on top in the scoring charts is PSG's Mikkel Hansen, ahead by 16 goals (121 vs 105).

"Veszprém are the favourites, we are the underdogs of the whole event," said THW Kiel coach Gislason ahead of the final weekend. Whilst the coach is being humble he is also being realistic, with a long list of injuries in mind. Rene Toft Hansen will definitely miss the VELUX EHF FINAL4; Steffen Weinhold could return and be the lucky joker, while Patrick Wiencek and Christian Dissinger have just returned from long-term injuries.

For Veszprém, the start of former THW right back Christian Zeitz is doubtful due to shoulder problems.

Kiel had a roller coaster ride in the group phase, when they won just five matches and suffered their first home defeat for more than four years, against PSG. In the Last 16, they were close to elimination against MOL-Pick Szeged, but turned the tide at home and then they rose like a phoenix from the ashes against defending champions FC Barcelona Lassa with a 29:24 home win in the first leg of the quarter-finals providing the base for an aggregate 59:57 win and their sixth participation at edition seven of the VELIUX FHF FINAL4.

After finishing runners-up of Group A in the group phase Veszprém had less problems in the knock-out stages, winning three of their four matches, including two in the Last 16 against HC Motor Zaporozhye and the first leg of the quarter-finals away in Skopje against HC Vardar 29:26 to leave the Macedonian champions behind and take the tie 59:56.

The biggest news from the 2015 and 2016 SEHA League champions in the VELUX EHF Champions League season was the departure of coach Antonio Carlos Ortega right after the first Champions League match - a draw against Plock back in September.

His successor, and former assistant Javier Sabate, now has the great chance to extend the series of Spanish coaches in EHF Champions League finals.

While Veszprém still wait for their first title in this competition, the VELUX EHF Champions League is the last chance for Kiel to avoid a season without any title for the first time in 13 years after missing trophies in the German Bundesliga and the German Cup.

If the German side win it would represent the seventh time they have appeared in the final of the elite men's European club handball tournament.

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To finish in fourth position in the group phase was the weakest final ranking of the three time EHF Champions League winners in as group phase ever. But this position results from a long series of long-term injuries: At the start of the season, both left wings - Dominik Klein and Torsten Jansen - were out, then Patrick Wiencek tore his crucial ligament in October, followed by the severe knee injury of team captain Rene Toft Hansen in December - thus, both line players are out until the end of the season. During the EURO in Poland, Steffen Weinhold and Christian Dissinger were out with adductor injuries, Weinhold is supposed to miss the rest of the season. Besides, Filip Jicha had left Kiel to Barcelona right before the first match of the season. Several new players - Igor Anic, Ilja Brozovic and Dener Jaanimaa - were signed during the season.

"It simply does not fit in such a short term", was the short analyse of coach Alfred Gislason. His team had started with a defeat at Zagreb, and then lost their first home match in the VELUX EHF Champions League after more than four years against Paris. Mainly those two clear defeats against the French champions (26:30, 30:37) hit the confidence of THW. But even before the winter break they showed their best Champions League match, beating Veszprém in a thrilling endgame at the comeback of Klein.

Having the 2007 World Champion back on track in his last season at THW, Kiel rose - but then were again hit hard by the biggest ever derby defeat against Flensburg (27:37). By winning the last two group matches they sealed the fourth position - and had something like a re-match in the Last 16, facing Szeged, the team they eliminated in the last season's quarter-finals.

Although Szeged created a promising four-goal cushion in the first leg, they lost it before the half-time of the second leg and Kiel avoided any thrilling moments in the closing minutes. In the quarter-finals they ousted the defending champions FC Barcelona Lassa taking care of that no team has been able to defend the title in Cologne for yet another year.

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Last year's finalist lost MKB from their name and Carlos Ortega from their bench in a matter of two months. While the bank's contract as sponsor simply ran out, the Spanish coach's was terminated after an unlucky draw at Plock in the first round of the VELUX EHF Champions League. All this at the wake of the defeat in the final of the Super Globe proved too much and the club parted ways with Ortega. His assistant Xavier Sabaté had been a popular figure ever since his arrival, yet there were few who thought that Ortega's departure could have a positive impact on Veszprém. Yet, Sabaté proved to be perfect fit for the job and quickly prompted the management to erase the word "interim" from his title. However, Xavi's magic could not have worked if it was not for the players willingness to swallow the bitter pill — needless to say his men loved Ortega — and picked up the pace their new coach demanded.

By no surprise Veszprém maintained their 100 per cent home record even when both right backs were injured and winger Péter Gulyás had to fill in, but both PSG and Kiel managed to beat the Hungarian powerhouse on home soil. However, with the full squad at his disposal Sabaté conquered the Flensburg fortress to prove Veszprém are still one of the top title contenders, who deliver when it matters. As long as inspirational leader and team captain László Nagy is fit, Veszprém have the slight edge against any of the other teams. The partnership of Mirko Alilovic and the massive defensive wall is hard to beat while Gasper Marguc, Ivan Sliskovic and Andreas Nilsson enjoy a great season in attack and the old guard of Chema, Nagy and Ilic can urge the long due conquest of the throne.

In the Last 16 against HC Motor Zaporozhye there was never really a doubt which team qualifies for the top eight as the Hungarian champions dominated both on the away and home court. Veszprém laid the foundations of their third straight ticket to the FINAL4 already in the first quarter-final leg at Vardar surviving the deafening cauldron in Skopje and bringing home a three-goal lead. Even their draw at home in the return leg could not stop them.

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Important regulations

What follows if a match ends in a draw

All matches of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

If a semi-final match or the final (place 1/2) ends in a draw, there will be a five-minute break followed by one extra time of 2 x 5 minutes, there will be a one minute break at half-time for the changeover of teams.

If the placement match 3/4 ends in a draw, there shall be no extra time, the match will be decided directly by penalty throws.

If penalty throws are needed to decide the match, the procedure is as follows:

- Prior to the penalty throws, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each, alternating with their opponents.
 Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws.
- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the Game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may perform as goalkeepers.
- At the Technical Meeting the teams will be informed at which goal the penalty throws will be taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If the scores are equal after the first round of penalty throws, it shall be continued until a decision is reached.
 In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- In the second round, a decision is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- Eligible players are players entered in the match report that have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.
- Serious infractions committed during penalty throws shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be supplementary named.
- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing court.
- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

Technology in use at the VELUX EHF FINAL4

Goal-line cameras The system uses special wide-angle cameras fixed to the crossbar to give a complete picture of the goal-line and at the request of the referee, the awarding of a goal can be checked on a video replay.

Goal-light An LED light installed behind the goal will light up at the same time as the buzzer sounds for team time-outs

and at the end of each half.

Instant replay Referees will also have the opportunity - in certain match situations - to refer to an instant video replay to

aid their decision making.

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Karabatic aims for fourth trophy in fourth jersey

FACTS AND FIGURES: 11 multiple winners of the Men's EHF Champions League will be on court at the VELUX EHF FINAL4 2016 in Cologne, including four-time champion Omeyer.

Two Frenchmen have the chance to continue their long series of triumphs, add to their trophy collection and write more pieces of handball history in Cologne.

PSG goalkeeper Thierry Omeyer can become the 12th male handball player in history to win the EHF Champions League five times.

With four EHF Champions League trophies in his tally — the first from 2003 with Montpellier, followed by three titles with Kiel — Omeyer is the most successful VELUX EHF FINAL4 participant at the 2016 edition.

Another Frenchman has a different goal: Nikola Karabatic is the only player at the VELUX EHF FINAL4 2016 in Cologne with the chance to defend the title. The 2007 and 2014 World Handball Player of the Year won the trophy one year ago with FC Barcelona and was named MVP of the event before he transferred to PSG.

If Karabatic raises the trophy in Cologne on 29 May he will be the first — of either individual players or teams — to defend his title in Cologne since the implementation of the VELUX EHF FINAL4 in LANXESS arena in 2009/10.

He would also become the first player in history to win the trophy with four different clubs: Montpellier, Kiel, Barcelona and PSG.

Besides Karabatic, three players on court in Cologne have won the Champions League three times: Kiel left wing Dominik Klein, Veszprém right back Christian Zeitz (both three times with Kiel) and Kielce playmaker Uros Zorman, who won the trophy twice with Ciudad Real and once with Celje.

In total, 11 multiple EHF Champions League winners will participate in the season's pinnacle event, as well as eight one-time winners of the competition.

The record holder is still Andrei Xepkin, who won the trophy six times with FC Barcelona before he ended his remarkable career with his seventh title with THW Kiel in 2007.

Four players have won six titles, among them former Barcelona goalkeepers David Barrufet and Tomas Svensson and their teammate Antonio Carlos Ortega.

Siarhei Rutenka, who won the title three times with Ciudad Real, twice with Barcelona and once with Celje, joined the list of six-time winners when Barca raised the trophy in 2015.

Season is almost over, what's next?

The European club season 2015/16 is almost over and although handball fans have to wait almost 100 days for the next European Cup match action, preparations for the new season have already started deep into the last edition. Regulations have been released, playing systems confirmed and important dates set.

Creation of the starting roster

Member federations of the EHF have to register their clubs eligible to take part in the European top flight by Tuesday 7 June.

The VELUX EHF Champions League 2016/17 will be played in the same mode as this season with 28 teams.

As always the distribution of places is a result of the EHF Ranking List which is a summary of the results in all three EHF club competitions of the seasons 2012/13, 2013/14 and 2014/15. The current 2015/16 season is not considered for the EHF Ranking List, but it will be considered for the seeding of the new participants in the various competitions of 2016/17.

The procedure for the awarding of additional places will also remain unchanged and each federation will have the right to ask for an upgrade of its EHF Cup club to VELUX EHF Champions League.

Already before the 2015/16 season the EHF has approved a list of criteria that will be used as a tool to define on the one hand the awarding of upgrades for those federations who will ask for it and on the other hand for the decision regarding the distribution of teams into groups A or B (8 teams each) respectively C or D (6 teams each). The criteria list consists of eight different fields (venue, TV, ranking in the domestic league, spectators, performance in past EHF club competitions, sponsoring potential, implementation of duties and regulations and new media).

Based on these criteria the EHF Executive Committee meeting in Vienna on Friday, 24 June will decide all upgrade requests and confirm 16 teams for groups A and B and remaining teams for groups C and D and for qualification tournament(s), whose winner(s) will join the group phase in C and/or D.

Draw in Denmark

Just seven days later the focus of all Champions League fans will shift to SELECT headquarters in Glostrup, Denmark, which will host the qualification and group phase draw (1 July 2016).

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
